WHAT IS CLASSICAL EDUCATION?

In 2015, we were blessed with an opportunity to transform our traditional Catholic school into a classical Catholic academy. The move offered the opportunity to set our school apart from others in the region. After six years, it couldn't be clearer that taking the path less traveled was God's plan for our school community. The transformation of our students academically, spiritually, and behaviorally has been evident.

So, what is classical education you ask? "Classical education is like a very large museum filled with many beautiful wonder-filled rooms that could be studied over a lifetime. It is a long tradition of education that has emphasized the seeking after of truth, goodness, and beauty and the study of liberal arts and the great books." (Classical Academic Press)

The school is separated into three sections: Lower Grammar (PK-2), Upper Grammar (3-5), and Logic School (6-8). Our content areas are also different than most. We study history, literature, nature studies, grammar, religion, Latin, logic, and mathematics.

History is our anchor subject. Students learn history in a sequential order starting with ancient civilizations followed by the Greek, Roman, Middle Ages, Renaissance, and New World periods. Our literature is closely intertwined with history. Students read novels and great works of literature tied to the period they are studying.

Our students are immersed in hands-on learning experiences, student-led dialogues, and creative opportunities which offer ways to explore and strengthen their spirituality and relationships with God. The rigorous academics paired with an engaging, religious learning environment prepares our students for the 21st century. Students are also exposed to many community service opportunities that allow them to see and experience a world beyond themselves. Their selflessness and kindness shine beyond their academics and are something that continues to make CDT such a special place.



CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT

In addition to our change in academics, we have also been blessed to see improvement to our school facilities. Without the generous support from our donors, fundraising, and grants, none of this would be possible.

In 2018, several of our teachers were awarded a grant from the diocese to construct a greenhouse on school property. Science instruction can now "grow" in an exciting, hands-on setting. With the generous donation of materials and time, owner Lester Sutton and Aggressive Grinding Service employees completed the construction of the greenhouse just prior to the start of the pandemic in March 2020.

In 2019, our staff recognized the opportunity and need for technology advancement at our school. They were awarded another grant through the diocese to construct The LIFT Center (Learning Innovatively from Technology). Students are immersed in opportunities to learn video recording and editing with state-of-the-art cameras and video editing software. In addition, recent technology purchases created a 1:1 device ratio which have been a critical component in our ability to serve our students through the pandemic.

At the close of the 2020-2021 school year, the eighth-grade class fundraised to renovate the teacher's lounge as their class gift. In addition to their fundraising, the students (with the help of Mr. Frye and their parents) spent an entire weekend transforming the lounge for the teachers.

For the 2021-2022 school year, the school community will also see the addition of a STREAM (Science, Technology, Religion, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) Room. This will include a 3D printer, robotics, virtual reality headsets, and more.

It is truly incredible to see dedication to the advancement of our school by so many and the generosity that follows. We are excited for the future and the opportunities to advance our school that will continue to provide our students with a rigorous, innovative, and creative education that will help them soar into their futures.

YOUR IMPACT BEGINS WITH THE ANNUAL FUND

Since the 2019-2020 school year, we have seen a 20% increase in our enrollment! With the generous 4 million dollar TOP Student Scholarship, we look forward to seeing our school continue to grow.

We have also been fortunate to have many local businesses and individuals participate in the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Program. This program allows participants to direct 75-90% of their state income taxes into a scholarship fund and receive a tax credit in return. Last year we raised \$84,000 to be used for scholarships. The EITC program has provided many of our families with the needed financial support that makes it possible for their children to attend CDT.

Each year, we have several **fundraising events** to support our operating costs. In the past, families have helped to raise money through cash calendar tickets, a cash bash, art auction, bingo, and the Race for Education. Despite the impact of the pandemic and the ability to fundraise in person, our fundraising efforts produced a record-breaking year in 2020-2021 with \$86,000 raised!

This year, our goal with the **annual fund** is to raise \$20,000. This money will allow us the freedom to embark on new, ambitious projects that will continue to uphold the integrity of our Catholic identity, the mission of our school, and our dedication to being an educational leader in our community.
